LETTER FROM THE CURATE

Dear Friends

Time is flying by, as I now settle down to write for the June edition of our parish magazine. Liturgically we enter into the long season of 'ordinary' time, where the vestments and altar frontals change to green, which not only represents growth, it can also be associated to new life. Throughout the numerous weeks of Trinity, I think it is important that we cherish this time and note its significance within the Christian calendar. It is a time where we can catch our breath after the whirlwind of seasons from Advent to Christmas, into Epiphany closely followed by Lent, then into Easter, through to Ascension and Pentecost.... Phew!!!.

What can seem a rather bland time in comparison, ordinary time provides opportunity to settle and reflect on all that was experienced through this busy period. This model should also be applied to our personal lives. Very often we can feel like we are on a treadmill with numerous demands that take up our time and energy, it is no wonder that occasionally we feel overwhelmed. There are simply not enough hours in the day to complete all the small jobs that need doing! Alternatively, it could seem as though there is too much time, especially to those who are feeling lonely or have lost their sense of purpose.

Trinity lasts for 21 weeks, it is a perfect time where we too can settle and reflect on our lives; in what we do, what we want and where we would like to be and most importantly, how to achieve it. Jesus knew what was required of him, but despite the demands put on him to perform miracles, heal and teach, it did not prevent him from retreating and spending time alone with God, praying and reflecting on the now and what was to come. He found time with God which centred him and directed him to God's will. In the hustle and bustle of life, God can often get pushed to one side. Trinity is a time for us to re-centre and re-focus on what God wants for us by meditating on what has been and what is to come, and where God is in all of this.

As a person who likes to plan ahead and have all my ducks lined up, more often than not I am always looking ahead to the next task, the next deadline, the next important date in the diary, but in doing this I often miss out on the beauty of living in the present and cherishing God's blessings. For me there are never enough hours in the day and if I dare to take time for myself I often feel guilty as though I should be doing something more productive. There is a wonderful line in Alice through the Looking Glass, where Alice is talking to 'time' after her adventures;

"I used to think time was a thief. But I see now you give before you take. And every day is a gift. Every minute. Every second."

Time is not a thief, it just seems that way when the demands on our time become so much that we are driven by the clock. Over this period of Trinity, I would like to encourage all of us to use this 'ordinary' time as a gift, to ask ourselves where we would like our lives to be, what we would like to change, what would we like to do more of, or less of. By allowing this time with God, we are able to open ourselves to new opportunities, and a deeper understanding of ourselves and where God is directing us. This can nurture and transform us in ways that are far from ordinary, but rather extraordinary!








New Kitchen Project

We are delighted to report that the amount raised so far for the new kitchen project is £57,409. This is over half way to our target of £110,000 to transform our church kitchen so we can continue and expand our community activities.



The project costs include building and electrical work, kitchen equipment and installation resulting in a bigger kitchen which will comply with all the required food safety and hygiene regulations. We are not able to start the work until we reach the target but are hopeful this will be later this year. We are grateful for all donations and every pound counts towards our target.

Grants

The way in which the hall and its kitchen are used to serve the community have been recognised by the many bodies that have already given a substantial amount in grants. We are very grateful to: The Peter Harrison Foundation - £25,000; Reigate & Banstead Borough Council - £10,000, Surrey County Council through the Member Allocation - £2,500; the Raven Housing Trust Brighter Community Fund - £3,113; the Gatwick Airport Community Trust - £3,000; Waitrose Community Matters - £448 and the Aviva Community Fund - £300.

We are regularly reviewing the numerous grants available to see if our project will qualify and are currently awaiting a decision on a significant application to BIFFA. Unfortunately, we were not successful with our application to the National Lottery Awards for All Scheme. There is a lot of competition for grant monies and many require a substantial amount to be raised before they are able to award monies so we are hoping that with the amount raised to date we have more chance of being successful with other applications.

Donations

Individual donations have also been substantial, totally £16,088 including gift aid, and we are extremely grateful to all those individuals for supporting the project. Purchases so far

The lockable freezer purchased with grant monies from Surrey County Council is already in use and the electricity supply to the hall has been upgraded ready to be connected when the kitchen is installed. We are also looking to buy a lockable fridge in the near future.

We are determined to do everything we can to have this kitchen in place this year and as always are grateful for your support.

Her Majesty's official birthday, and even better, help us to raise money.



This event is raising money for SAFAD (Silsoe Aid for Appropriate Development), a British charity run by students at Cranfield University. SAFAD has sent over 340 Cranfield graduates to almost 40 different countries in the developing world since 1969. Each year, student volunteers work with local organisations to help provide training and expertise in areas such as water, soil and environmental sciences, engineering, management and health.

SAFAD aims to help relieve poverty by promoting appropriate development, community participation and capacity building to create sustainable livelihoods. In order to do this, SAFAD funds volunteers to work with local NGOs and communities, using the technical knowledge acquired during their post-graduate work at Cranfield. The volunteers, in turn, gain experience through their work.

The Brunch is supporting a graduate student going over to Honduras to work with Pure Water for the World, an organisation that works in remote and underserved regions of developing countries that lack sustainable, safe drinking water. Their projects provide safe water, hygiene education and sanitation to children, families and communities. They work with local governments and community partners to select and analyse the appropriate technology for the community and to implement cost effective projects.

The placement will be for a period of between six months and a year and PWW will pay for the student's living expenses. The money raised at the brunch will be going towards air travel, visa fees and vaccination costs.

Our Christian Aid event went really well, with the St

Mark's Singers and Dr John Shaw's beautiful playing really adding to the sense of occasion. We raised a staggering '£482.01' + Gift Aid

Confirmation - After several weeks of preparation, Ben, Alex, Marion, Jane-Anne

and I made our way to Southwark Cathedral for the confirmation service straight after the Christian Aid event. After having a bite to eat in the refectory before the rehearsal at 2pm, the main service began at 4pm. The service was very moving, especially as members of St Mark's church had also come to support Ben and Alex in this important step in their faith journey.



Archdeacon Moira — It was a privilege to be joined by our Archdeacon at Pentecost for both Sunday services and to hear her preach. Archdeacon Moira was very impressed with St Mark's Singers who outdid themselves once again with 'this little light of mine' which had her dancing in the aisle - literally!!!

Gardens – The eagle eyed among you would have noticed the addition of a bench in our beautiful garden. This was donated by Anne Cramp in memory of her parents. I will have the honour of dedicating & blessing this in the near future.





We have such wonderful memorial areas which provide a place of tranquillity and peace, something we seldom find in our busy lives. May I take this opportunity to say "thank you" to Phil and Liz Davies for the maintenance work they do. The grounds and war memorial, which are such a public

feature of St Mark's Church, look absolutely stunning.

Brooklands School – I was delighted to be invited to the Brooklands School - Royal Wedding Celebration. The pupils and staff are amazing and I am always very excited when we are able to join them. Our Easter tree which was hand made by the pupils, has sadly just been taken down, but we look forward to harvest when the pupils and staff will join us again at St Mark's.



How can I tell – Part 2 - Following the success of Part 1 held earlier in April, part 2 was led by Reverend Sarah Alexander about how we proclaim our faith and have the confidence to tell others about what we believe and why! It was an enlightening evening which was enjoyed by everyone there.

Memorial Service – We had a memorial service to celebrate the life of Sheila Keen a much-loved member of our community, may she Rest in Peace. †

These are just a few of the main events over the past few weeks, these do not of course, include the administration of emails, intercessions, structuring services for Messy Church, funerals and dedications, the research needed for sermons for weekday services as well as Sunday services. It does not include the pastoral visits, PCC meetings and various sub committees and deanery events, training days in London and essay writing or the ad-hoc tasks which crop up in between.

This is not an attempt to gain sympathy, but to simply highlight some of the work that is seldom seen. It is also why we need your prayers for all clergy and for their parish administrators! May I say a huge **'thank you'** to Shona who regularly stays beyond her contracted hours to complete all the tasks that are thrown her way, including at the moment, the complex work on GDPR. 


