LETTER FROM THE VICAR

Dear Friends

We are already a month into 2019 and so much seems to have happened. As we journey through the year I'm sure we all have our own hopes and plans, and possibly some fears over what lies ahead. At the time of writing there is utter confusion over BREXIT and what this means, when it might happen, and so many other questions. I guess that as you read this nothing will have been resolved, engendering anxiety and fear for the future.



Some of our hopes and fears for the future, whether personal or for the whole community, may be realised, others may not. The unexpected may happen and bring us sorrow or joy. The expected may happen in ways we do not anticipate. The truth and joy of the Christian faith is the knowledge that in the midst of everything God is with us.

Questions we should often ask ourselves include: where is our focus? What will we value the most? Where will we spend our time and energy? What will we forget? And what will we remember? What will motivate us this year? Our family... our personal ambitions... our relationship with God... our desire for social justice... growth in God's kingdom...?

Church historian and theologian, Jaroslav Pelikan says, "Tradition is the living faith of dead people to which we must add our chapter while we have the gift of life... Traditionalism is the dead faith of living people who fear that if anything changes then the whole enterprise will crumble."

We can all be guilty of sometimes being too interested in maintaining the status quo, of following traditionalism, which eventually leads to a joyless faith, an empty church, a hopeless world. We see changes in the way we do things in church from using new media in worship, to new services such as the new Family Service on the First Sunday at 4pm. Some changes we may embrace enthusiastically, but other changes we may grumble about. But in all this at St Mark's we are following our tradition and not traditionalism.

Since its foundation in 1860, St Mark's has constantly changed and evolved and is stronger for this. My research into the history of the church bears that out – if you haven't read my book, copies are still available from the office at £7.50 a copy. We can all learn from our tradition and history, but we must guard against sliding into traditionalism.

As we travel through this year may we seek after God's own heart. The tradition of Anglicanism means we are called to add our chapter to the history of our faith as we look at all times and in all places to share the Good News of Jesus Christ who declared "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."

What if we did everything with love, not just for our family and friends but in every aspect of our lives? What if even the most basic everyday tasks were performed with complete love and adoration?


My mother used to tell me she stirred her love into every single cup of tea she ever made me. To this day no one makes a better cup of tea than her, it is even better than I make for myself.

SMOAT Beetle Drive – 10 February 2019, 3pm to 5pm



Come and join us on Sunday 10 February for a fun family game for all ages from 5 to 105. There will be lots of homemade cake (including some honey cake, I'm sure!), tea and coffee and there will also be a tombola! We are raising money for a Bees for Development project in Ethiopia, where they will be aiming to teach beekeeping skills to landless families.

In 2017, Bees for Development started working with 100 landless people (aged 20-30). With no land of their own, these people were in desperate need of diversifying their sources of income, to raise money to buy food. Landlessness is an underlying cause of food insecurity. Last year, Bees for Development Ethiopia delivered Phase 1 of the Project, basic training in beekeeping, and provided a small package of inputs:

- 100 landless youth have basic skills in beekeeping and know how to make top-bar hives, at low cost, using locally available materials
- New beekeepers have made on average 3 hives each
- Each new beekeeper received one bee colony
- Each new beekeeper received one set of top-bars (enough for one top-bar hive)



With the help of SMOAT, they are now hoping to deliver Phase 2 of the project. The one year of beekeeping training and experience is not sufficient for everyone to become fully proficient in beekeeping. Plus, all new beekeepers want to make more hives and procure more bees. The hardest

part of making top-bar hives is making the bars themselves, which need to be of the correct dimension (32mm in width) to work well.

They now plan to identify ten of the most enterprising and dedicated new beekeepers and give them Phase 2 training. This will include:

- How to make and use bait hives to catch wild swarms
- How to make their own top-bars, to reduce need to buy or order from a carpenter
- How to grade and handle honey when harvesting, to secure the best prices

Those who receive Phase 2 training will be asked to pass on their learning to other new beekeepers who live near them. This way we reach more people and achieve greater change.

The overall aim is to enable landless youth to increase their household income and build more resilient livelihoods, through beekeeping. Target: 20% increase in household income.

This project is targeting women and men, all from households which do not own their own land. Women in Ethiopia suffer from marginalisation and experience the worse consequences of poverty. Assets and income within the home tend to be controlled by men. In this project Bees for Development are purposely facilitating women to own their own bees and harvest and sell their own honey, and so earn some financial independence. This gives them a greater chance to decide how income can be used, for their own benefit and for that of their children.

"I am excited to be learning beekeeping. This is an easy job for women because it does not take a lot of time, yet honey fetches high prices in the market" Siranesh Gedamu, Ligaba.

So, come along and join us. It will be a lovely afternoon of family fun and together we will be helping many women and men in Ligaba to make a sustainable income for themselves and their families. If you would like tickets, please contact me on barbara@barbaraperkins.co.uk.

Our Community Kitchen

Our new kitchen has been really busy over the last couple of months and the facilities have been appreciated by all. Some new equipment was purchased including glasses, a cutlery trolley and pots and pans for the new ovens.

Events in December included wreath making which raised over £450, Christmas events for the Parent and Toddler group and the Social Dance and mulled wine served after the Junior Church production and carol service.

A traditional Christmas dinner was served to around 60 guests at Community Lunch and 'pigs in blankets' were the favourite part with the children at Messy Church the following week. On Christmas Day itself Voluntary Action Reigate and Banstead hosted their Festive Feast for those who would otherwise be on their own, feeding around 130 people including volunteers.

In January St Mark's hosted the Deanery Chapter meeting combined with the Commissioning of the Area Dean by Bishop Jonathan. Lunch was provided to a group of nearly 70 people who were all very impressed by the food and the facilities. Well done Shona for all your cooking!

On the fundraising side we were delighted to be awarded £2,000 from the Tesco Bags of Help scheme and with other generous donations we are very close to being able to replace the partition doors to the committee room as these are no longer able to be pulled back due to the extension of the kitchen.

Once again we just want to say how very grateful we are to EVERYONE who has donated to and supported the project in every way. We received a substantial amount in grants but this wouldn't have been possible without the support of the congregation and the amount of community work that goes on in our church centre.

We are still working hard to try to make the user friendly as possible with kitchen as everywhere how instructions on to use appliances and how to leave everything for the next user afterwards. 

Book Review

This month we review: They called us Love



Written by Deborah Meroff, this book is the biography of April Holden and her work with the street children of Africa. April — a pen name, was called to missionary work at a young age and in spite of health problems, which doctors told her would lead to her death if she went to Africa, April successfully set up 'the Centre for Love'. A place of refuge and respite for young African boys who lived on the streets and had suffered abuse and addiction, the centres of which April founded more than one, became home for many of the boys and helped them to grow and strive, with new skills, health care, an education and most importantly love.

The book which starts with 'Fear not...I have called you by name, you are mine.' (Isaiah 43.1), details the journey April takes, how she came to missionary work, the troubles which faced her and how God's love and guidance helped her on her journey. The book does not say which country April worked in but the political situation described suggests it was Sudan, detailing, from April's perspective, the atrocities in Darfur and the splitting of the country to create South Sudan.

The author, Deborah Meroff, a journalist and photographer for 27 years who travelled to 215 countries, the book documents the key events of April's mission work. It misses the more emotional side of her struggles, particularly around her health troubles. But it really opens one's eyes to the struggles faced in North Africa, not just in Sudan but touches on Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Madagascar. Overall, April's ability to persevere to overcome the most difficult obstacles is inspirational and may have you questioning how you can fulfil God's purpose for you.

Alternative Valentine ideas – from around the world

On the 14 February lovers around the global and here in Reigate will be celebrating Valentine's Day, an age old tradition which originated in ancient Rome. It is believed that Emperor Claudius II executed two men by the name of Valentine on the 14 February in the 3rd century. The Roman Catholic Church celebrated their martyrdom and this is how the celebrations began, it has taken centuries to become the romantic event we recognise today.

Valentine's Day has been adopted all over the world but it's not always acknowledged with hearts, chocolates and flowers. Here are 5 alternatives from around the globe.

In Denmark

The Danish men like to send their valentine's a joking letter, known as 'gaekkebrew' which includes a funny poem and is usually cut into a pretty pattern. The sender remains anonymous and if the lucky receiver can guess the person who sent it, they will receive an Easter Egg, as a reward, later in the year.

In Japan and South Korea

On the 14 February it is the women who have to woo the men with a small gift, usually chocolates. However, ladies are rewarded one month later when men return the favour three fold, on the 14 March, known as White Day.

In Norfolk, England

Children receive gifts such as chocolates and small toys from 'Jack Valentine'. The Santa of Valentine's Day leaves presents at the front door or bottom of the bed and like the Tooth Fairy and his Christmas counterpart, he has never been seen.


In South Africa

On Valentine's Day women literally wear their hearts on their sleeve. The ladies pin or sew the name of their beloved on the sleeve of their tops. This tradition originates from an ancient Roman festival known as Lupercalia.

In Bulgaria


14 February is St Trifon Zarezan Day known as 'Winemakers' Day'. St Trifon Zarezan is the guardian of vines in Bulgaria. The day is one of celebration where local villagers dance and party together. Couples celebrate with a glass (or three) of fine wine.



asleep, dreaming of happy hearts, dancing ribbons and bright stars.






