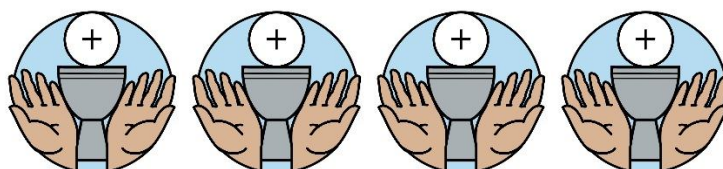

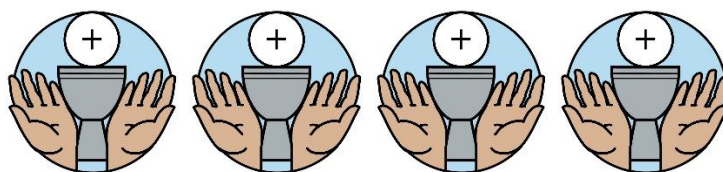

Southwark bids 'farewell' to Bishop Christopher

The Diocese of Southwark has given thanks for the ministry of The Rt Revd Christopher Chessun, the 10th Bishop of Southwark, as he prepares to retire from his role. The special Valedictory Eucharist, at which Bishop Christopher presided and preached, took place at Southwark Cathedral on Saturday 18 July.

"As a person approaches retirement, there are inevitably plenty of opportunities to say goodbye – but there are rarely enough opportunities to express appreciation and gratitude," said Bishop Christopher in his sermon. "So, the first and most important thing I wish to say today is 'thank you.' Thank you for who you are, and for all that you give. I retire with a deep and heartfelt sense of gratitude for the joy of walking alongside you as fellow pilgrims in the way of Christ, and all of us working together for the common good. It has been a great and joyful privilege to serve in this wonderful Diocese, caring from 2005 for the Woolwich Episcopal Area and then since 2011 for South London and East Surrey as Diocesan Bishop. Thank you."

During the service, Bishop Christopher handed on the Diocesan Crozier to The Rt Revd Dr Rosemarie Mallett, Bishop of Croydon, who will serve as Acting Bishop of Southwark until a new Diocesan Bishop is appointed. Bishop Christopher was also symbolically divested of his mitre and chasuble, which were laid on the altar at Southwark Cathedral.

Reflecting on the memories and reflections that others have shared about Bishop Christopher's ministry, Diocesan Secretary Nicola Thomas said: "The theme that has come through, again and again, is his ability to call people by name, to make the person that he is dealing with, in that moment, feel seen, heard, noticed, special. Bishop Christopher has operated in a fully integrated way as pastor and leader – in one of his favourite phrases, he has 'inhabited' the role of Bishop of Southwark in a way that seems to permeate his entire mode of being. Bishop Christopher, we will miss you."

Addressing Bishop Christopher at the end of the service, The Dean of Southwark, The Very Revd Dr Mark Oakley, said: "You have unapologetically placed spirituality, our lives of faith and the call to mission as a gift to the world, right at our heart. You have led many pilgrimages, encouraged parishes and church communities in prayer, sought to deepen faith in chaplaincies, clergy, ordinands, laity, all of us, to make sure our first love of God does not grow cold, gently reminding us to attend to our souls so that the Church maintains one. You have been a pilgrim amongst pilgrims, a generous pastor, and a teacher in the school of Jesus Christ because, at the end of the day, only God matters. We have needed to hear this and, please God, we will continue to."

Bishop Christopher will retire on his 70th birthday in August 2026, after 43 years in ordained ministry.

About Bishop Christopher

Christopher Chessun was born in 1956 in Hampton, Middlesex, the elder of identical twins. He trained for the priesthood at Westcott House, Cambridge, and was ordained as deacon in 1983. He served his title at St Michael & All Angels, Sandhurst, before moving on in 1987 to the post of senior curate at St Mary, Portsea in Portsmouth Diocese.



In 1989 he became Chaplain and Minor Canon at St Paul's Cathedral and Vocations Adviser in the Diocese of London in 1990, staying in both these roles until 1993 when he was appointed Rector of St Dunstan & All Saints', Stepney. Between 1997 and 2001 he was Area Dean of Tower Hamlets. In Stepney he held a number of ex-officio posts on the governing bodies of various trusts and church schools. In April 2001 he was installed as Archdeacon of Northolt and during this time he was a trustee of the North Thames Ministerial Training Course, Chairman of the Trustees of St George's Chapel at Heathrow Airport and of the London Diocesan Schools' Committee.

In April 2005 he was consecrated Bishop in Southwark Cathedral, taking up his appointment as Area Bishop of Woolwich and Urban Bishop for the Diocese of Southwark. The Woolwich Area is linked with the Diocese of Manicaland in the eastern highlands of Zimbabwe. Bishop Christopher made an initial visit in June 2006, the first of a number of visits to strengthen the inter-diocesan links.

In March 2011 he began public ministry as the tenth Bishop of Southwark. He is a strong advocate for the parish system as the most effective means of church presence and engagement in the life of local communities – including the need to proclaim the Gospel afresh amidst rapid changes in church and community life. He is also the Church of England's Lead Bishop for the Middle East and in this role has coordinated a number of diocesan pilgrimages to the Holy Land, participated as an Anglican ecumenical delegate in the annual Vatican-mandated Holy Land Coordination and worked for peace with justice for the Christian, Muslim and Jewish peoples of Israel and Palestine.



Churches in Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) call for help to fight Ebola outbreak

As cases of Ebola in northeastern DRC continue to spread, the Bishop of Goma, the Rt Revd Martin Gordon, has joined other church leaders there in calling for urgent help.

The country is facing its 17th Ebola outbreak in 50 years. More than 1,100 people have been affected, with over 350 dead.

Bishp Martin, a Church Mission Society (CMS) mission partner, says that churches across DRC can play a critical role in response. "The church is on the frontline. Through our schools, clinics, and local congregations, we are at the heart of every village and community, and we are one of the few institutions still trusted to tell the truth."

For it is widespread public mistrust of the authorities that has led many communities to doubt the very existence of Ebola. Restrictions surrounding burials have only intensified tensions, and already two Ebola treatment centres have been set on fire.

Meanwhile, church leaders are circulating pastoral guidance outlining Ebola symptoms and encouraging best practices for hygiene, physical contact and medical referrals. Plans are underway to equip churches and schools with temperature screening equipment.

But Bishop Martin stresses that financial support from outside is essential. "We need support to equip frontline churches and schools, and help communities respond effectively," he said. "But above all, we ask people to pray for us - for effective treatment development and for churches to continue to be voices of hope."

Andy Roberts, the CEO of Church Mission Society (CMS) says: "Bishop Martin and other church leaders have shown extraordinary courage. They are not fleeing the danger; they are moving toward it with love, practical help and hope."

All in the month of AUGUST

It was:

250 years ago, on 2 August 1776 that the formal signing of the US Declaration of Independence took place.

175 years ago, on 12 August 1851 that the American inventor Isaac Singer was granted a US Patent for his sewing machine. Since then, well over 100 million various models of Singer sewing machines have been sold worldwide.

125 years ago, on 4 August 1901 that Louis Armstrong, American jazz trumpeter and singer, was born.

70 years ago, on 27 August 1956 that Britain's first nuclear power station, Calder Hall in Cumbria, began operating. It was the first nuclear power station in the world to generate power on an industrial scale and formed part of the Sellafield complex. Closed in 2003.

65 years ago, on 13 August 1961 that East Germany sealed the border between East and West Berlin with barbed wire to prevent an exodus of refugees to the West. Construction on the Berlin Wall began on 15 August. The border reopened in 1989.

40 years ago, on 9 August 1986 that the rock band Queen performed its final live concert at Knebworth Park before the death of singer Freddie Mercury. (Pneumonia, late 1991.)

30 years ago, on 23 August 1996 that Saudi Arabian-born terrorist Osama bin Laden issued a fatwa entitled *A Declaration of War Against the Americans Occupying the Land of the Two Holy Places*. Few people knew who he was, and his declaration received little attention.

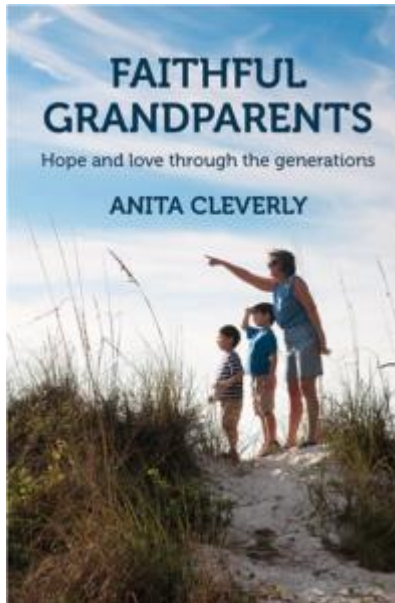
Also 30 years ago, on 28 August 1996 that Prince Charles and Princess Diana were divorced after 15 years of marriage.

15 years ago, on 21 August 2011 that Hurricane Irene hit the Caribbean and then North Carolina. 49 people were killed and more than \$14 billion worth of damage was done.

10 years ago, on 29 August 2016 that Gene Wilder, American film actor, died. (Films include *Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory* and *Blazing Saddles*.)

Leaving a legacy

Legacy gifts can make a huge difference to churches. Each year, gifts in wills, ranging from £100s to £100,000s are received. Faithful witnesses leaving generous legacies have enabled churches to invest in their buildings, pioneer new ministries, and sustain a welcoming presence in their communities.

Why should you write a will?

Writing a will means you choose:

- How you would like to share your property and possessions;
- Who you would like to look after any children under the age of 18;
- How to support any charities or churches that are important to you.

Without a will, these decisions will be made according to pre-ordained rules, and by the courts, which may be different from your wishes. Leaving a will gives you peace of mind and lifts a burden from loved ones after you are gone.

To make it easier the Church of England has partnered with Farewill, the UK's favourite will-writer, so anyone can write a simple will online for free, in as little as 30 minutes. You can find out more by visiting <https://farewill.com/southwarkdiocese>

We strongly advise seeing a solicitor for more complicated wills, or for people wishing to review their existing will or add a codicil.

A gift for future generations

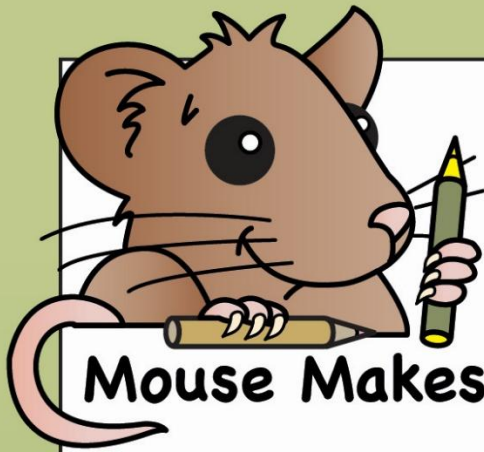
After you have made provision for your family and friends, we hope you'll also consider leaving a gift in your will to St Mark's. A legacy is a valuable expression of how meaningful a church has been during your time there. It's a way to give thanks - a lasting testimony to the faithfulness, goodness and generosity of God.

The policy of the PCC is to use legacies to help fund additional mission or development projects in the parish, whether buildings, equipment or staff. Circumstances change over the years, so church members are encouraged to leave legacies for the general purposes of the parish. The PCC will discuss the most appropriate use of the legacy in the light of current projects and the donor's known areas of interest in the church (for example, children and youth, music, buildings).

You may also receive tax benefits for including a gift to St Mark's in your will. A gift in your will to a charity is free of inheritance tax and may also reduce the amount of tax payable on the rest of your will. <https://www.gov.uk/donating-to-charity/leaving-gifts-to-charity-in-your-will>

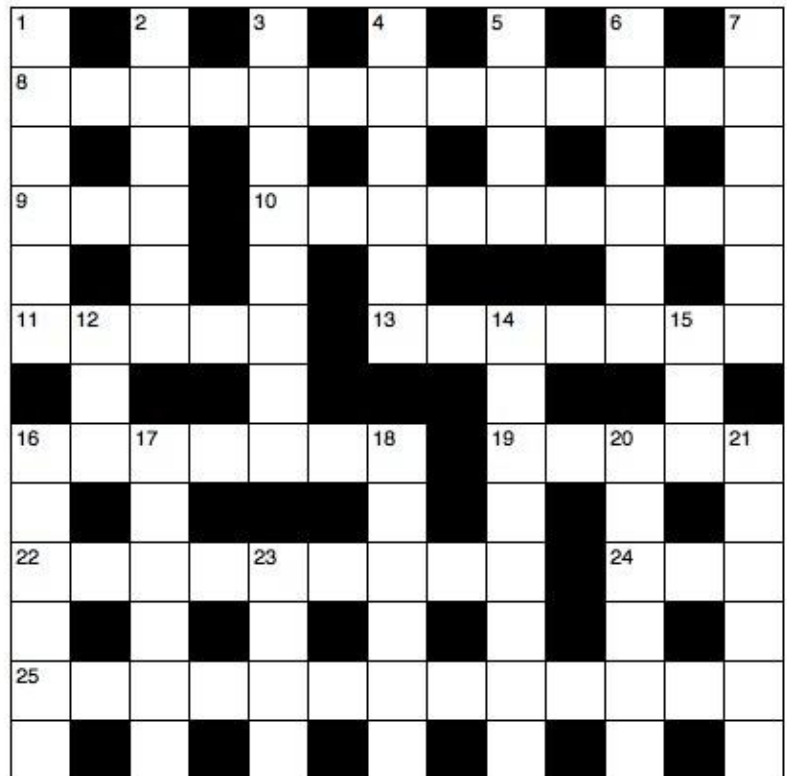

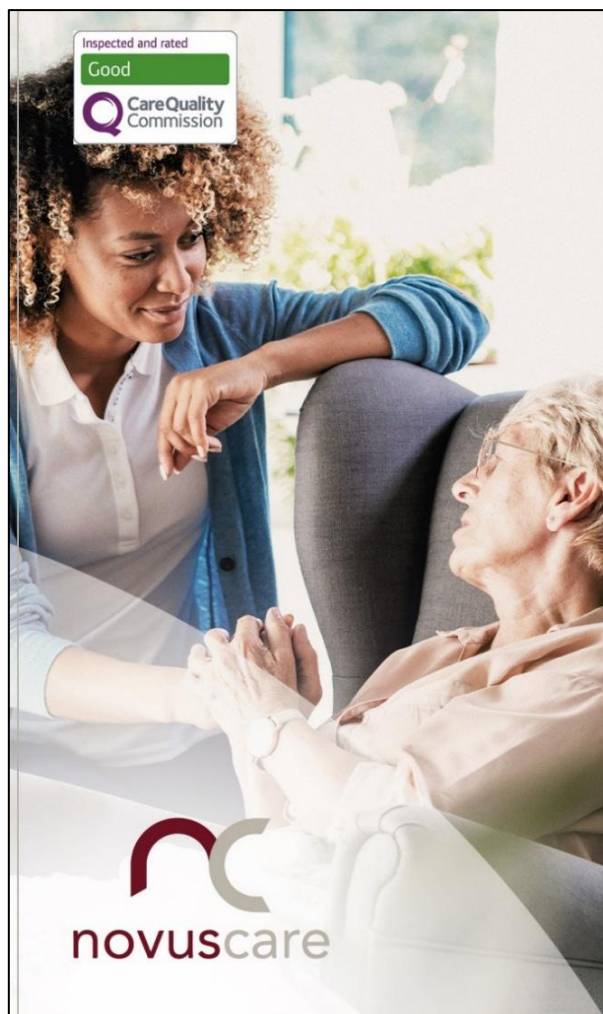
